+A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO ST. MATTHEW+ Jesus said to his disciples: "You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and then put it under a bushel basket, it is set on a lamp stand, where it gives light to all in the house. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your heavenly Father.

LITURGICAL NOTES:

You will notice that the liturgical color reflected in the priest and altar vestment of the day is green. This color denotes the liturgical season known as "Ordinary Time." With the celebration of the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord last Sunday, the Church's reflection upon the mysteries of the Incarnation of Christ (through His conception within the womb of the Blessed Virgin, His birth into the world as both God and Man and His Revelation to the entire world as King of Kings (in the Feat of the Epiphany); has come to a liturgical close. Now the liturgy of the Church in both the Liturgy of the Hours, (sung daily in our church as a unbroken prayer of the Church), is in transition to the next great season of Lent, during which the liturgy of the Church will concentrate on the Redemptive acts of Jesus. As we all know, the Season of Lent lasts for 40 days and in our liturgical tradition is preceded by three Sundays of a sort of preparation and transition time known as pre-Lent. Pre-Lent is marked by SEPTUAGESIMA SUNDAY (meaning 70), then SEXAGESIMA SUNDAY (meaning 60) and finally OUINOUAGESIMA SUNDAY (denoting 50). Although only Quinquagesima Sunday is an accurate count of the number of actual days until Easter, no one is quite sure why the pre-Lenten Sundays preceding it are so named as they do not denote the exact number of days from their celebration to the Solemnity of the Resurrection. At any rate these three Sundays of pre-Lent assist us in transitioning in mind (through spiritual reflection), body (through our fasting) and Spirit, (through intensified prayer) to the spirit of Holy Lent.
